Instructions

- Do not turn over the page until you are told to do so.
- You may work the questions out in your head, or by writing on the white area around the question.
- Work as quickly and as carefully as you can.
- Make any alterations to your answers **clearly**. You will not lose marks for crossing out.
- You will have 60 minutes to do the test. If you find you cannot do a question, **do not waste time** on it but go on to the next one.
- Once the test has begun, you should not ask about questions in the test.
- The use of electronic calculators of any description (including calculator watches) is NOT permitted.

Your time will start when you turn over the page.

The passage below is from 'The War of the Worlds' by HG Wells.

1 At first I regarded little but the road before me, and then abruptly my attention was arrested by something that was

16 went altogether. Not stopping to look again, I wrenched the horse's head hard round to the right, and in another
17 moment the dog-cart had heeled over upon the horse; the shafts smashed noisily, and I was flung sideways and

18 fell heavily into a shallow pool of water.

19 I crawled out almost immediately, and crouched, my feet still in the water, under a clump of furze. The horse bolted
20 and by the lightning flashes I saw the black bulk of the overturned dog-cart and the silhouette of the wheel still

21 spinning slowly. In another moment the colossal mechanism went striding by me, and passed uphill towards
22 Pyrford.

23 Seen nearer, the Thing was incredibly strange, for it was no mere insensate machine driving on its way. Machine it
24 was, with a ringing metallic pace, and long, flexible, glittering tentacles (one of which gripped a young pine-tree)

25 swinging and rattling about its strange body. It picked its road as it went striding along, and the brazen hood that
26 surmounted it moved to and fro with the inevitable suggestion of a head looking about it. Behind the main body was

27 a huge mass of white metal like a gigantic fisherman's basket, and puffs of green smoke squirted out from the joints
28 of the limbs as the monster swept by me. And in an instant it was gone.

29 So much I saw then, all vaguely for the flickering of the lightning, in blinding high lights and dense black shadows.

Mock exam content

Each paper has the same subjects that you will find in the test itself.

Paper 1 contains questions on English and comprehension. Paper 2 contains questions on Maths.



11 Plus Mock Exam Information- Essex

Mock Papers Administration:

1. Set a date and time in advance to sit the mock paper (e.g., Next Saturday at 10:00am)
2. During the week remember to reference the upcoming date to build a little stress and tension. It is important children get used to the feeling of an approaching exam date.
3. The evening before, treat it as you would the actual exam. Think about early bedtime, relaxation, proper nutrition etc. Organise where the test will be taken the next day.
4. In the morning, treat it as you would the morning of the exam itself.
5. Read out the instructions as if you were the invigilator and follow the instructions throughout the test. These invigilator instructions are below.
6. If your child needs to go to the loo during the exam, keep the clock running. The clock will not pause in the exam hall for a loo break.

Invigilator instructions:

Paper 1:

1. Your child should be sat at a desk with Paper 1 in front of them at least 5 minutes before the exam. This is an important part of emulating the actual exam and introducing your child to the feeling of tension that they will feel on the day of the real exam. Your child is not allowed a calculator for this exam.
2. Tell your child "Paper 1 consists of a 60 minute Maths test. All answers must be marked in the spaces provided. Make any alterations to your answers clearly. You will not lose marks for crossing out."

Invigilation notes

We take great care to provide detailed instructions and invigilation notes for every paper. This will enable your child to have a realistic mock exam experience from home.

At the time you have set to begin the exam, tell your child "The exam begins in 5 minutes."
5 minutes before the exam, tell your child, "You may turn over the page and begin the exam. You have 1 hour."
At the end of the English test tell your child "You are halfway through paper 1. You have 30 minutes left"
15 minutes tell your child "You have 5 minutes left".
When the 5 minutes has elapsed tell your child "That is the end of the paper 1, please put your pen down."
After the break they should have a half hour break. They should use this break to go to the toilet and get some refreshments. They should be back in their seat with Paper 2 in front of them at least 5 minutes before paper 2 is set to begin. It's important that they manage this break themselves because you won't be there on the day to help them.

Paper 2:

9. Tell your child "Paper 2 consists of three sections. The first is a comprehension test. You will have 10 minutes to read the text and 30 minutes to answer the questions that follow. However, you do not need to wait to be told to start the questions and you can look back at the passage as many times as you want. The second section consists of applied reasoning questions. You will have 10 minutes to complete this section. The third section is a writing test. You will have 20 minutes to answer 2 questions. "
